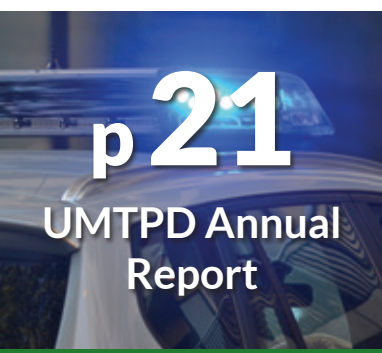

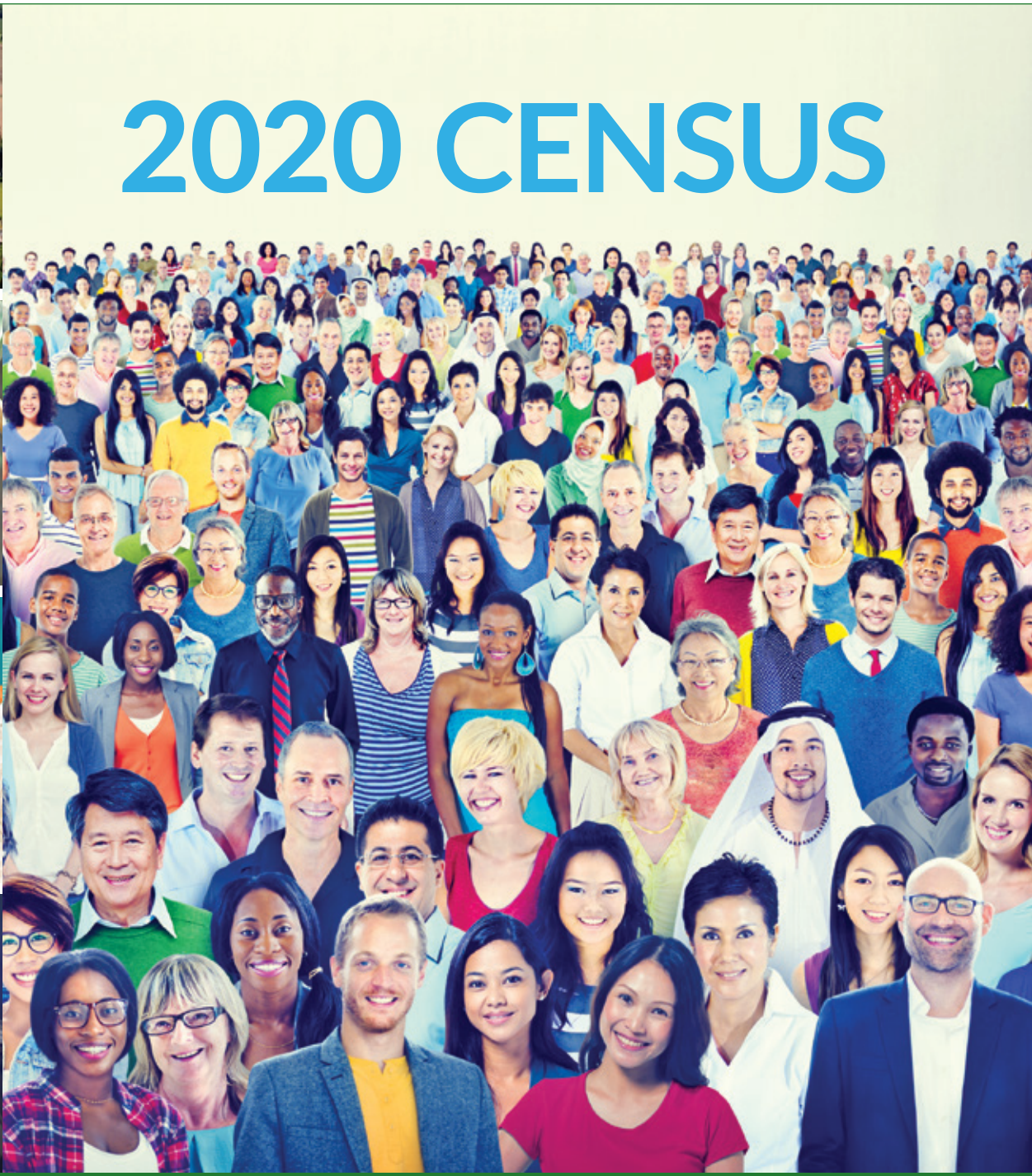

YOU'VE BEEN HEARING ABOUT IT ON TELEVISION, IN THE NEWSPAPER, AND ON SOCIAL MEDIA FOR OVER A YEAR – FINALLY, CENSUS 2020 IS HERE!

The United States Census Bureau has begun conducting the 2020 Census – each and every household has received postcards and letters from the Bureau inviting them to respond. The easiest and quickest way to complete this is online - the first time this has ever been offered as part of a Census. To do so, log on to www.2020census.gov. You can also still respond via mail or phone as well, and all three ways just take a few minutes of your time.

So, why is the Census important, you ask? Well, did you know that the Census is mentioned in the SIXTH sentence of the Constitution of the United States of America? It's one of the first items that was mandated by the founding fathers of our nation because it truly is that important.

Many things are dependent on an accurate count of persons residing within a specific geographic area - two of the most significant are: the amount of federal

funding provided to each state and county, which ultimately impacts each municipality (every resident accounts for nearly \$2,100 PER YEAR!); the second is the number of members in the U.S. House of Representatives that each state is afforded, providing a local voice in Washington, D.C. There are many other benefits and facts about the importance of an accurate count during the 2020 Census which you can explore at 2020census.gov.

The Census website also provides daily updates as to the response rates of all municipalities across the country. Currently, as of the publication of this newsletter, the response rate of the United States as a whole is 56.6%; the Pennsylvania response rate is 58.8%; Lehigh County is at 65.8%; and Upper Macungie Township's response is at 69.4%. This means that so far we're doing a great job, but we can do even better! Let's see how close to 100% we can get!

Please log on to www.2020census.gov and respond today, and help Upper Macungie Township be counted accurately, ensuring that all our citizens receive the maximum benefit they are due! Thank You!

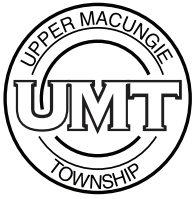

Comprehensive Plan Update:

PURPOSE OF THE PLAN

1. Manage land use and shape the character, timing, and layout of future development.
2. Preserve and conserve agricultural land, forests, historic landmarks, and cultural resources.
3. Protect the environment and natural resources.
4. Plan for the reliable supply of water.
5. Meet the housing needs of present and future residents.
6. Revitalize and enhance historic villages.
7. Identify and implement transportation and capital improvements.
8. Provide for community facilities, utilities, and services needed by a growing population.

On October 3, 2019 the Upper Macungie Township Board of Supervisors passed a resolution adopting the 2019 Comprehensive Plan. This is the culmination of a citizen-driven planning process which included the Upper Macungie Township Planning Commission, a Steering Committee (comprised of residents, professionals and local business owners), planning consultants, Township staff, and the Lehigh Valley Planning Commission.

PURPOSE OF THE PLAN:

As indicated in the Executive Summary, "Upper Macungie Township plays an important role in the region's economy with respect to manufacturing, warehouse distribution and logistics, farming, natural and agricultural resources, high quality educational facilities, recreation, housing, and an educated labor force. The Township administration and decision-makers recognize that the population will change, the local and regional economy will fluctuate, the housing stock will age, the environment and natural resources will continue to be threatened by the impacts of development, and the needs of citizens will not be the same today as in the past or in the future. The Township Supervisors authorized the development of this plan as an update to the 2007 UMT Comprehensive Plan with this new plan built around achieving sustainability. The planning horizon for this plan is 20 years with emphasis on land use, preservation, and growth management."

MISSION STATEMENT:

"The mission of this plan and those involved in developing the 2019 Comprehensive Plan was to provide a blueprint to guide future decisions that will enhance the quality of life. This plan provides a vision, goals, objectives, policies, plan elements, strategies, and tools to assist UMT planners, staff, the Planning Commission, other boards and commissions, and the Board of Supervisors to meet today and tomorrow's challenges and to assist with achieving a sustainable community vision for 2040."

COMMUNITY ISSUES AND IMPLICATIONS:

In considering the proposed plan the key issues listed below were found to be priorities gathered from community input. These items are addressed through goals, objectives, policies, strategies, and implementation of the Plan;

- Traffic Congestion
- Community Character and Sense of Place
- Large-Scale Warehouse Distribution
- Housing Quality, Choice, and Affordability
- Community Connectivity
- Preservation and Conservation of Land
- Commercial & Industrial Development/Redevelopment

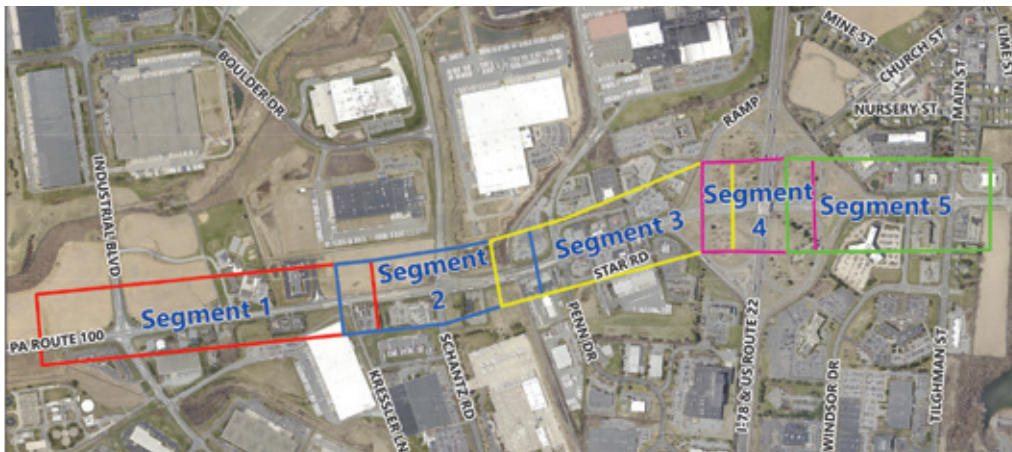
The Township Supervisors, staff, Boards and Commissions will use this plan as a guide in making decisions that will shape the future of our Township.

ENGINEERING DISTRICT 5

BEGINS MAJOR RECONSTRUCTION OF PA 100 IN UPPER MACUNGIE TOWNSHIP, LEHIGH COUNTY



PennDOT Engineering District 5 recently awarded a \$19.1 million contract to reconstruct the 4 and 6 lane sections of PA 100 from Industrial Boulevard to Main Street/Tilghman Street in Fogelsville.

This project includes major roadway reconstruction, storm sewer improvements, water main relocation, curb replacement, milling and overlay of the PA 100/I-78 interchange ramps, upgraded traffic signal equipment, Americans with Disabilities Act accessible (ADA) ramp improvements at the intersection of PA 100 and Schantz Road, a new overhead sign structure at the entrance to the two-lane ramp from PA 100 north to I-78 east, and other miscellaneous construction.

This section of roadway is a major commercial and industrial corridor in the Lehigh Valley, with an average daily traffic

volume of over 36,000 vehicles (21% trucks). Manufacturers such as Boston Beer Company, Keurig Dr. Pepper, Nestle Waters N.A., Niagara Bottling, Coca-Cola, Ocean Spray and Bimbo Bakeries all have major production facilities along the corridor. And multiple large volume distribution facilities in the area include Amazon, Bridgestone Tires, Nestle Distribution, and Home Depot. This area also has many restaurants, hotels and other retail businesses.

This project will be completed in five segments with segment one completed first which includes the length of Route 100 from Industrial Boulevard to Kressler Lane. The traffic control for segment one will have Route 100 southbound left turn restrictions at Industrial Blvd and Kressler Lane, all lanes of traffic westbound on Industrial Boulevard will be detoured to Schantz Road. It is anticipated for segment one to be completed in the Fall of 2020.

New Enterprise Stone & Lime Co., Inc. of New Enterprise, PA is the general contractor on the project, which is expected to be complete in August 2022.

PENNDOT ENGINEERING DISTRICT SR 222 SAFETY IMPROVEMENTS

ROUNDBOUT AT SR 222 AND SCHANTZ ROAD IN UPPER MACUNGIE TOWNSHIP, LEHIGH COUNTY

PennDOT Engineering District 5 plans to install a roundabout at the intersection of SR 222 and Schantz Road as part of the SR 222 Safety Improvements. As stated by PennDOT Secretary Leslie S. Richards, "Our data shows that modern-day roundabouts reduce crash severity and injuries while improving traffic flow," "This underscores why roundabouts are becoming more commonplace in Pennsylvania and beyond."

Parkland School District, Intersection Improvements at Schantz Road and Arrowhead Lane/Twinponds Road in Upper Macungie Township, Lehigh County

As part of the new Veterans Memorial Elementary School, Parkland School District project, improvements to the intersection of Schantz Road and

The improvements will include the removal of the current temporary traffic signal located at Hamilton Blvd. (Route 222) and Schantz Road and at Route 222 and Farmington Road. The roundabout will be installed at the Route 222 and Farmington Road intersection and Schantz Road will have access cut off to SR 22 and a cul-de-sac installed. In addition, the Schantz Road and Independent/Farmington Road intersection will be realigned to better accommodate traffic flow and the proposed roundabout. PennDOT is

Arrowhead Lane/Twin Ponds Road will be completed. These improvements include the addition of a signalized intersection to support the new school and provide added safety benefits. Twin Ponds Road will be shifted to better align with Arrowhead Lane. Also proposed are the additions of left turning lanes, and a westbound right turn lane on Schantz Road. Signalize crosswalks and Americans with Disabilities Act accessible (ADA) ramps will be provided.

Parkland School District is currently awaiting PennDOT approval to begin these improvements, and it is anticipated that these improvements will begin by the summer of 2020 and completed for Fall of 2020.



UPPER MACUNGIE TOWNSHIP 2020 TRAFFIC SIGNAL RETIMING PROJECT

Upper Macungie Supervisors have funded a project to update traffic signal timings for all signalized intersections within the Township during calendar year 2020. Currently there are 45 traffic signals in Upper Macungie Township and the goal of this project is to conduct traffic counts at each traffic signal and optimize the signal timings based upon the current level of traffic volumes using our roadways.

Other benefits of this project will be less delay and congestion for our residents and other motorists travelling on our roadways. This can be accomplished ensuring that our traffic signals are effectively distributing the green-light time based upon traffic volume. With less traffic delay a reduction in gas consumption and emissions from an overall viewpoint of the project will produce less detrimental impacts to the environment. The objective of this project is to eliminate traffic delays and ease congestion.

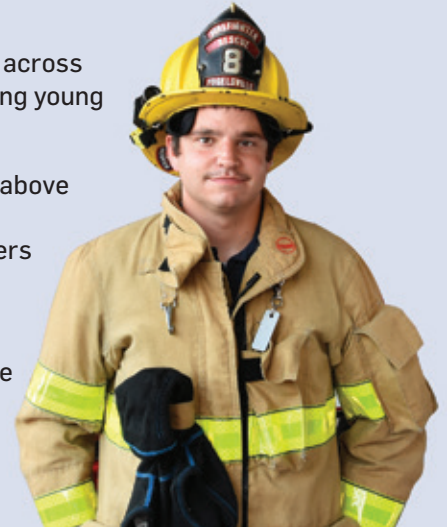
UMT's LIVE-IN Program is Ideal for Young People Interested in Living Cost-Free While Serving the Community

Live-in programs sponsored by UMT's Bureau of Fire and other volunteer fire companies across the U.S. are aimed at bolstering 24/7 support for community fire protection while providing young adults with a financially smart alternative to paying rent or living at home.

Qualified candidates for UMT's Live-In program reside in a freshly renovated apartment above Fogelsville Fire Co. Station #8, complete with comfortable living spaces, full kitchen, washer/dryer, WIFI, big screen TV and Sony PlayStation®. In exchange, Live-In volunteers are required to perform some station duties, attend training and meetings, and respond to emergency calls.

"It's great for anyone who wants to save on living costs while still having time for college studies or a part-time job," says Nick Bosga (photo right), 25, a Live-In volunteer who also works as a local contractor. "I love the flexibility and, because I live here, I'm the first guy at the station when an emergency call comes in!"

UMT Bureau of Fire Innovating Strategies to Recruit & Retain Volunteers

“Results are encouraging” so far in innovative communication tactics funded by FEMA grant

To address the threat of fewer citizen volunteers to sustain the existence of America’s volunteer fire companies, Upper Macungie Township has launched a series of communication initiatives to recruit new members and retain existing members.

“We can’t afford to do nothing,” says Grant Grim, Director of UMT’s Bureau of Fire. “Our commitment to community safety is too important and our traditions run way too deep to take a ‘wait and see’ attitude toward this national decline in volunteers. We studied our options and have innovated a pro-active approach to boost recruitment and retention. So far, the results are encouraging.”

Funded with grants available from the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), the Bureau launched a multi-year communications and community outreach plan in 2018 which includes the following:

- New website at **UMTfire.com** with upgraded content, connectivity and analytics.
- **Profiles In Performance:** an ongoing series (shown) published in the Parkland Press recognizing real firefighters at UMT’s three fire companies and their own reasons for making such a personal commitment to protect their community.
- Digital billboards in high-traffic routes showcasing real UMT firefighters with an appeal to join in the cause. Many thanks to caring community partners Adams Outdoor and Lamar Advertising for contributing the billboard space.
- Increased recruiting outreach and enhanced marketing presence at community events and venues throughout the calendar year.
- Attractive incentives for all volunteers—firefighters, fire police, support service specialists and more—which include free health club memberships, life insurance and stipends.



In addition, the Bureau is currently planning advanced digital marketing and other “new media” tactics to reach a broader audience of prospects. “It’s an ongoing effort,” says Grim. “We are exploring all the tools and techniques available to keep our message out there and sustain our volunteer levels.”

Are You Protected by the City of Allentown Fire Department? Are You Sure?

A common misconception among many UMT residents is that because they have an “Allentown, PA” mailing address at their homes, their fire protection is provided by the City of Allentown Fire Department.

This is not the case. In fact, if you received this Township newsletter in your mailbox, it is a certainty that your primary fire protection is provided by one or more of Upper Macungie Township’s three volunteer fire companies.

The City of Allentown has a very proficient, professional fire department which costs taxpayers several millions of dollars every year. As such, their primary responsibilities are to respond to calls within the Allentown city limits.

Families and property within Upper Macungie Township are protected first and foremost by our three volunteer fire companies. The volunteer structure of this community service saves more than lives and property...it also saves UMT taxpayers millions of dollars every year. JUNIOR EMERGENCY SERVICES ACADEMY



EMERGENCY SERVICES ACADEMY WEEK

JULY 20 - 24, 2020

Rest easy, Upper Macungie...our next generation of emergency response professionals is off to a great start. The Class of 2019 for our Junior Emergency Services Academy included local youngsters ages 12 to 16 and all of them graduated from the rigorous summer program with flying colors.

Conducted annually by the UMT Bureau of Fire in concert with our three volunteer fire companies, the UMT Police Department and Cetronia Ambulance Corps, the Academy provides students with hands-on lifesaving skills in multiple first response disciplines and early experience for possible future careers in firefighting, law enforcement and EMS. All students earn certification in Heartsaver CPR/AED and first aid, proper use of fire extinguishers, firefighting search and rescue techniques, digital forensics, hostage negotiations and more. The free program concludes with a demonstration of their new skills at a family picnic.

WASTE REMOVAL/RECYCLING GUIDELINES

Yard Waste Drop-off Site & Information

For your convenience, Upper Macungie Township provides property owners with the means to properly dispose of their leaves and yard wastes. We conduct curbside pickup twice a year in the spring (May) and the fall (October).

CURBSIDE YARD-WASTE PICKUP: **Wednesday, October 7, 2020.**

Semi-annually each year, there are Fall (October) and Spring (May) one-time curbside pickups of yard-waste for; leaves from trees, garden residue, shrubbery trimmings, and tree trimmings. See restrictions below.

Limbs and branches tied and bundled to a maximum of 48" x 18" x 18".
If branches and limbs are not tied and bundled, they will not be picked up.

NO PLASTIC BAGS, STONES, LUMBER, GRASS CLIPPINGS OR ROOTS WILL BE COLLECTED!

Items improperly bagged or bundled will not be accepted.

Leaf waste can be placed in open trash containers, no larger than 32 gallon capacity and less than 60 pounds. A combined maximum of six (6) bundles or containers per household will be collected.

PLEASE PUT YOUR YARD-WASTE OUT THE NIGHT BEFORE THE PICK UP.

IF YOU MISSED THE PICK-UP DATE: Yard-wastes may be deposited at the UMT Yard Waste Drop-off Site located on the corner or intersection of Schantz & Grim Roads, next to the Public Works garage. Drop-off services is made available ONLY to Township Residents. Contractors and businesses are NOT permitted to use this facility.



YARD WASTE DROP-OFF SITE HOURS:

Spring/Summer/Fall Hours: April 1 - Nov. 7		Winter Hours: Nov. 8 - Mar. 31	DROP-OFF INSTRUCTIONS: UMT residents may drop-off grass clippings, leaves, shrubs and small trees. All waste must be removed from bags. Please remember that grass must be separated from other yard-waste. Shrubs and small trees no longer than 4 feet long and 5 inches wide are accepted.

Please place your trash cart out for collection the night before your pick up day at curb/or grass area several feet away from the mailbox, landscaping, or telephone poles. It should not be placed on the street. Your recycle bin can be placed several feet from the cart. As a reminder any trash placed outside your cart will not be collected. However, you can purchase another cart with no additional monthly cost. Residents are allowed to have a maximum of two 95 gallon carts.

PPL Electric Utilities transmission line projects update

Resilient transmission for a reliable future. The power grid is like our highway and local road system. Transmission lines are the electrical highway system, delivering electricity safely and efficiently over long distances. Improving the transmission system provides reliable, affordable and sustainable electricity.

Work continues in Upper Macungie Township and nearby areas on several PPL Electric Utilities power line projects meant to improve power grid reliability and resilience.

Though construction is expected to wrap up by the end of 2020, here's where each currently stands.

Higher Voltage Transmission Project: This involves rebuilding 500-kilovolt transmission lines between our Breinigsville and Albutis substations, about six miles. We're finished with the foundations for the new H-frame structures and expect to be actively installing new H-frame structures as spring arrives. Work is expected to be complete around mid-summer. The plan is to work from south to north, starting in Albutis.

Lower Voltage Transmission Project: This work involves replacing older wooden poles on a 69-kilovolt line with newer, stronger steel poles for about nine miles between our Breinigsville substation and the turnpike. Work began near Breinigsville and will proceed from west to east. Work should end in December, but land restoration will likely

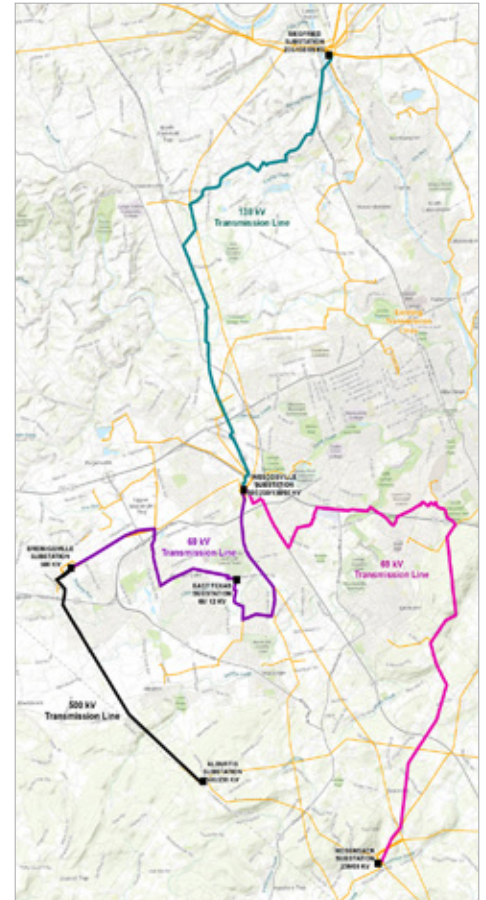
continue into fall 2021 because of winter weather.

Hosensack-Wescosville Phase 5 rebuild project: As of mid-February, we were working in Lower Macungie Township off Minesite Road and through the residential areas to the east. We're working the project west to east, except for work at the Wescosville substation which will occur in November 2020.

Siegfried-Wescosville fiber installation project: This work to replace the overhead shield wire is being done by helicopter. Upper Macungie residents will likely see activity between April and May.

As these improvements are completed, PPL will continue to work hand in hand with township officials to keep them informed and address any concerns that might arise. Remember that we will not need to turn off power to homes or businesses in either project.

Keeping the power grid strong is part of our commitment to deliver for our customers and provide top-tier power reliability.

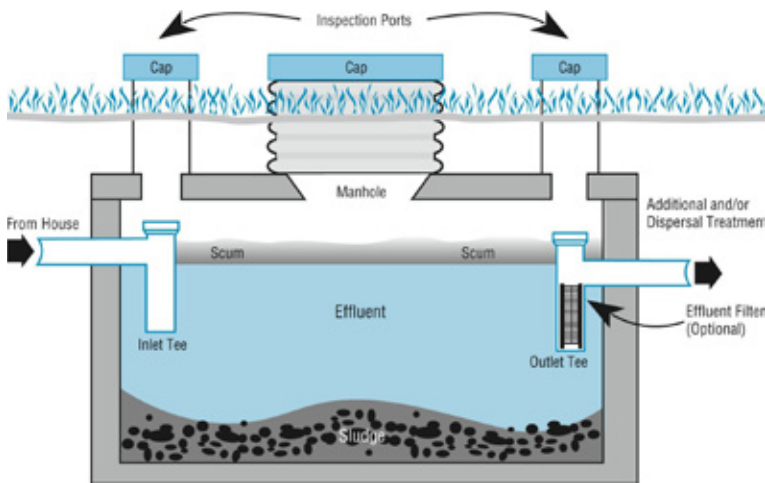

SEPTIC TANK PUMPING

The first important component of your septic system is the septic tank, an underground watertight receptacle constructed to receive wastewater from your home. This tank separates the solids and liquids, partially digests organic matter, stores sludge and scum and delivers relatively clear effluent to the absorption area.

In a properly functioning treatment tank, solids and liquids are effectively separated. Solids and partially decomposed sludge settle to the bottom of the tank and accumulate while a scum of lightweight material (including fats and greases) rise to the top. The partially clarified liquid that lie between the scum and sludge layers flows out to the absorption area.



Regular and proper cleaning is one way to help prolong your on-lot sewage system.

- **Make sure** that the pumper opens the main access of the septic tank when cleaning it out. This allows the tank to be completely cleaned out.
- **Never pump** the tank through the 4" or 6" inspection port that is situated over the baffles. Only a small portion of the tank will be cleaned and risk of damaging the baffles inside the tank is high.
- **Inspect the condition** of the baffles. If missing, broken, damaged, or deteriorated, they should be replaced immediately. They serve an important purpose in helping to prolong the life of your system.

When the sludge and scum layers are not routinely pumped out, the area in the tank available for clarification decreases. Solids will enter the absorption area at an accelerated rate, and the absorption area clogs prematurely. Effluent "ponds" form over the absorption area onto the surface of the ground. Sewage finds its way to a stream or road ditch, or back up into your home.

ON-LOT SEWAGE MANAGEMENT UPDATE Sewage System Inspections Mandatory in 2020 for District 2 Properties

This is an ordinance mandated by DEP to monitor the proper function of on-lot sewage systems to protect our water table and overall environment. This directive is divided into three districts.

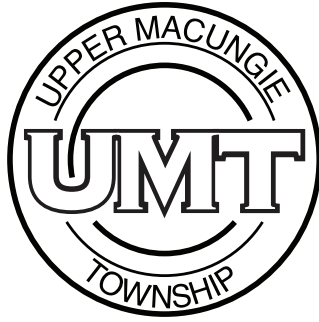
DISTRICT 1

Meets all requirements with no complications in 2019.

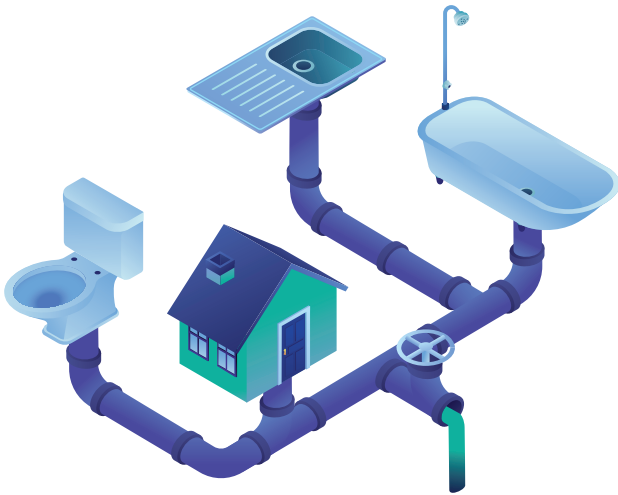
DISTRICT 2

Property owners are required to have their septic systems cleaned and inspected by a registered pumper/hauler before December 31, 2020. A list of registered pumper/haulers can be found on our website, uppermac.org.

Scheduled maintenance of your on-lot septic system helps reduce high costs incurred by property owners should their septic system fail but ultimately protects and maintains a healthy environment for future generations. 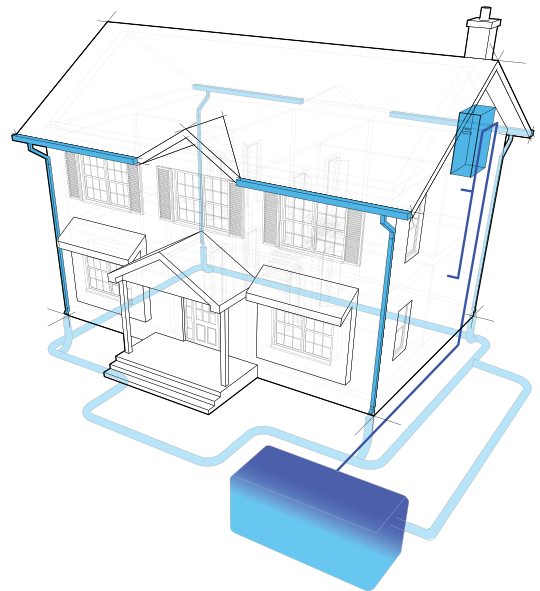

STORMWATER:

The Township would like all homeowners to be aware that if your house was built after 2013 there is a possibility that your property has a stormwater feature to capture and treat rainwater. These features are non-structural Best Management Practices (BMP) but are mostly commonly known as rain gardens, amended soils, swales and infiltration pits. As the homeowner you are responsible for the maintenance and continued operation of these BMP's. This is one important reason that property owners contact the Township for a permit before making any changes to your property such as adding a deck or patio, swimming pool or shed installations, creating an addition to your home or expanding a driveway. The Township does maintain a database of BMP's on all properties and those with BMP's will be contacted by the Township in the near future regarding the inspection and maintenance of your BMP.

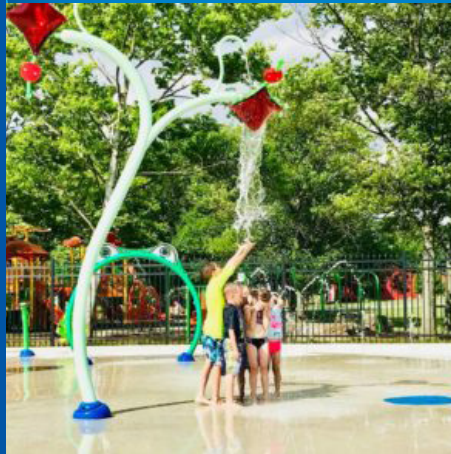

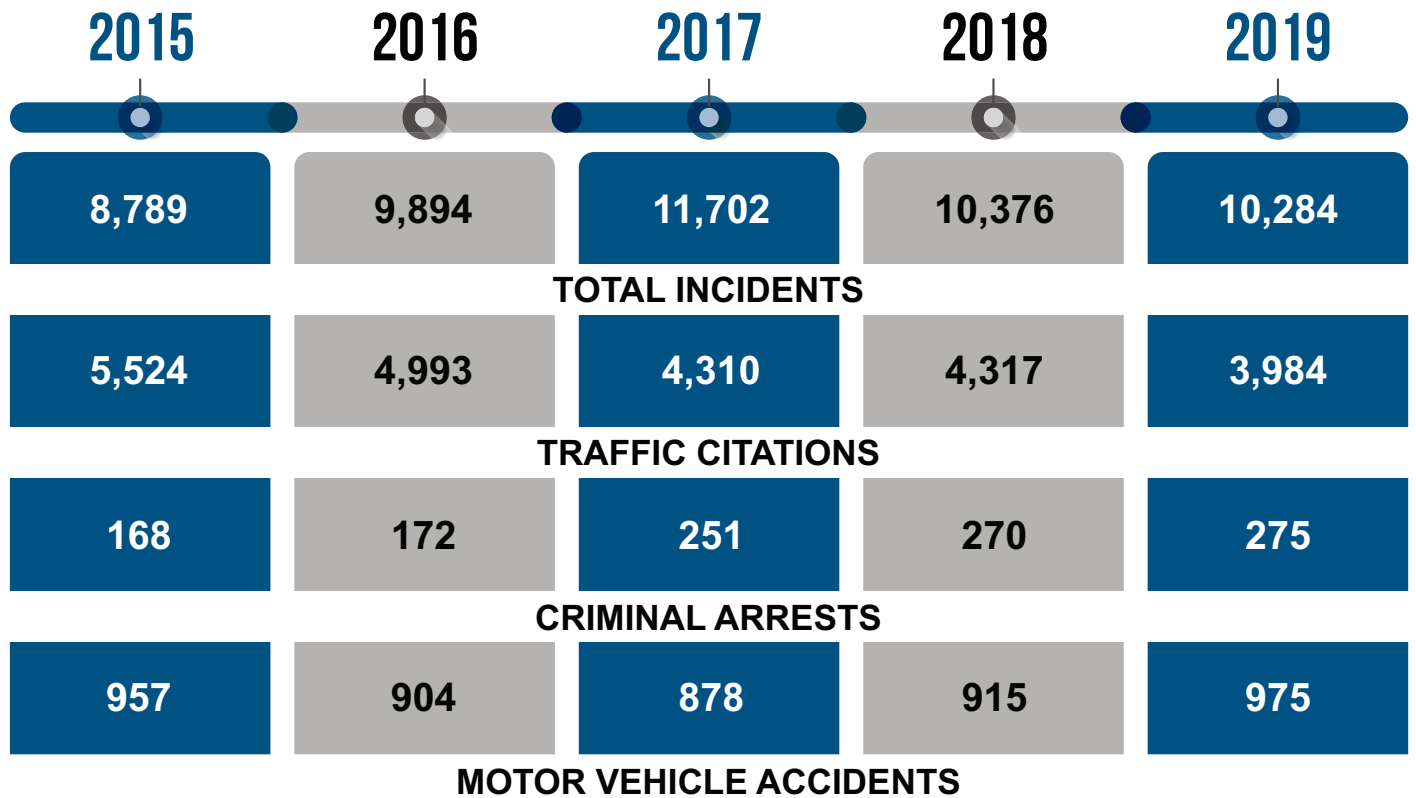

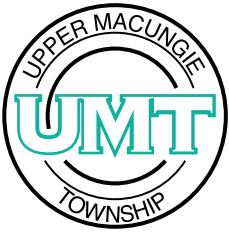
